 - I've heard London has Europe's best shopping, tell me more?
- Am I going to need to buy a plug &/or power adaptor for the electricity in England?
 - Are Londoners friendly? Is London safe?

For me, London is the most exciting city in the world: it has the diversity of New York, the history of Rome and the buzz of Tokyo all rolled in to one! You are going to love it, and if we can help you along that road, the happier we will be!
